Memoir

Stephen Peter Pedone, Lt. Col., USAF, Ret.

Stephen Peter Pedone, Lt. Col, USAF, Retired has provided the memoir of his rewarding military and defense contractor career in both traditional mapping, charting & geodesy (MC&G) and the earliest digital geospatial data programs, and Intelligence, in direct support to our military service combat forces, advanced weapon system developers, and

the National Intelligence Community. His military career spanned twenty-five years, from 1965 through 1990, serving for 13 years in multiple assignments with NGA legacy organizations.

Lt. Col. Pedone’s career provided a special opportunity to participate in the unique transition period from traditional individual military service-focused MC&G cartography and film photogrammetry, to the start of the "digital revolution", which brought the first digital geospatial data bases, digital satellite imagery, and advanced digital weapon guidance systems, mission planning systems, command & control systems, and much more. It was truly the beginning of what became today's "Geospatial-Intelligence" (GEOINT), and the catalyst that spurred the DMA and the National Imagery & Mapping Agency (NIMA) legacy organizational realignments, which led directly to today's National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency (NGA).

Following retirement from the Air Force, Pedone was a systems engineer, from 1991 to 2004, with a major defense contractor. He contributed to the development of the “front-end” digital image processing workstation, as well as other digital imagery and major computing systems for the National Intelligence Community.

On this year’s 75th D-Day Anniversary, Pedone prepared an original full article, titled "The D-Day Pilot and Flight Nurse", to remember, celebrate and honor his dad and mom's D-Day service in June 1944. The shorter version of the article in July issue of the **FLY PAST** magazine was re-titled "Invasion Sweethearts".

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IN REMEMBRANCE



William Douglas Morgan (Bill) passed away July 31, 2019 in Gainesville, FL at the age of 96. He was born in Montreal, Canada on February 28, 1923. He spent his childhood in Boston, Massachusetts. After high school he and his family moved to Washington, D.C. where he was employed as an apprentice lithographic pressman at the Engineer Reproduction Plant (later, the Army Map Service.) In 1942 he enlisted in the Army, became a Staff Sergeant, and was sent to Burma as an aerial photo interpreter. In 1945 he was one of a handful of men sent to repatriate 350 allied prisoners of war from a camp in south China. He was decorated by the U.S. and Chinese governments for this work.

After World War II he returned to the Army Map Service to continue his career. In 1946 he met and married Allie Marie Butler of Princeton, KY. They made their home in Arlington, VA and had two children, Lorna (Cookie) and Douglas. Bill next began working at the Pentagon as a senior technical advisor to the Chief of Staff, Army on matters of data processing. Bill retired from the Pentagon in 1970, at the age of 47, much to the envy of all who knew him. He and Allie spent 39 years traveling in their recreational vehicle, visiting all 50 US states, most of the provinces of Canada, and half of the states of Mexico. During those years, they volunteer with Wycliffe Bible Translators, working for extended periods in Guatemala and California.



Herbert Vance (Woody) Woodworth, born July 13, 1929 in Newburyport, Massachusetts and passed away peacefully May 14, 2019 in his home in Winter Park, Florida after a long, hard fight with Alzheimer's. Woody joined the Army in 1948 in his yearning to follow his siblings' footsteps in serving his country. His 3 ½ years in the service and time in many foreign countries lead to a commendation to join the Inter-American Geodetic Surveyors in Central and Southern America, later becoming the Defense Mapping Agency.

After assignments in the Panama Canal and Venezuela, his commission in Cuba would put an end to his bachelor days. When he first laid eyes on Margarita del Pilar Diaz Fernandez, he said to a friend, "I just saw my future wife". They married three years later December 27, 1958 in Havana, Cuba. They shared in a life-long love affair and marriage of over 59 years. In their early years of marriage, they lived in Bogotá, Columbia, British Guiana and would purchase their forever home in Winter Park, Florida. They continued their travel around the world living in Warrensburg, Missouri, the birthplace of their son, Warren; Port of Sudan, Khartoum, Sudan, the birthplace of their daughter, Cynthia; and later in Tehran, Iran. All of Woody's missions overseas required spending months "in the field", thus every trip home was a great reunion. His assignment on Kwajalein in the Marshall Islands would finally allow him to return home almost every night so he could spend time with the family and watch his children in their endeavors. He would always return to the beloved farmhouse of his youth in East Kingston, NH to complete upkeep and repairs. He eventually

purchased the farmhouse from his mother which fondly became known as The Woodworth Farm. In his retirement years, Woody spent half the year at The Woodworth Farm, with his wife Margarita, restoring and enjoying it and the winter months in Winter Park, in order to keep his darling wife warm. His final resting place will be alongside his lovely wife at the East Kingston Cemetery, next to the farm he so dearly loved and worked tirelessly to preserve. Herbert is survived by his loving children, son Warren Woodworth and wife Glenda, daughter Cynthia Woodworth, and numerous grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death his beloved wife of nearly 60 years, Margarita Diaz Woodworth, who made countless sacrifices in her caring for him. Actually, I'm not complaining because I am a Senager. (Senior teenager) I have everything that I

Thanksgiving is an annual one-day holiday to give thanks, traditionally to God, for the things one has at the end of the harvest season. The 1941 U.S. Congress created a bill establishing Thanksgiving would occur annually on the fourth Thursday of November. On November 26, 1941, President Roosevelt signed bill into U.S. law.

In the United States, certain kinds of food are traditionally served at Thanksgiving meals. First and foremost, turkey is usually the featured item on any Thanksgiving feast table. Stuffing, mashed potatoes with gravy, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, maize, other fall vegetables, and pumpkin pie are commonly associated with Thanksgiving dinner. All of these primary dishes are actually native to America.



On Thanksgiving Day, families and friends usually gather for a large meal or dinner, the result being that the Thanksgiving holiday weekend is one of the busiest travel periods of the year.

Veterans Day is a well-known American holiday, but there are also a few misconceptions about it — like how it’s spelled or whom exactly it celebrates. To clear some of that up, here are the important facts you should know.

- **Veterans Day does NOT have an apostrophe.**

A lot of people think it’s “Veteran’s Day” or “Veterans’ Day,” but they’re wrong. The holiday is not a day that “belongs” to one veteran or multiple veterans, which is what an apostrophe implies. It’s a day for honoring all veterans — so no apostrophe needed.

- **Veterans Day is NOT the Same as Memorial Day.**

A lot of Americans get this confused, and we’ll be honest — it can be a little annoying to all of the living veterans out there.

Memorial Day is a time to remember those who gave their lives for our country, particularly in battle or from wounds they suffered in battle. Veterans Day honors all of those who have served the country in war or peace — dead or alive — although it’s largely intended to thank living veterans for their sacrifices.

- **It was originally called Armistice Day, commemorating the end of World War I.**

World War I officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919. However, the fighting ended about seven months before that when the Allies and Germany put into effect an armistice on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

For that reason, Nov. 11, 1918, was largely considered the end of “the war to end all wars” and dubbed Armistice Day. In 1926, Congress officially recognized it as the end of the war, and in 1938, it became an official holiday, primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I.

But then World War II and the Korean War happened, so on June 1, 1954, at the urging of veterans service organizations, Congress amended the commemoration yet again by changing the word “armistice” to “veterans” so the day would honor American veterans of all wars. For a while, Veterans Day’s date was changed, too, and it confused everybody.

Congress signed the Uniform Holiday Bill in 1968 to ensure that a few federal holidays — Veterans Day included —

would be celebrated on a Monday. Officials hoped it would spur travel and other family activities over a long weekend, which would stimulate the economy.

- **For some inexplicable reason, the bill set Veterans Day commemorations for the fourth Monday of every October.**

On Oct. 25, 1971, the first Veterans Day under this new bill was held. We’re not sure why it took three years to implement, but not surprisingly, there was a lot of confusion about the change, and many states were unhappy, choosing to continue to recognize the day as they previously had — in November.

Within a few years, it became pretty apparent that most U.S. citizens wanted to celebrate Veterans Day on Nov. 11, since it was a matter of historic and patriotic significance. So on Sept. 20, 1975, President Gerald Ford signed another law (Public Law 94-97), which returned the annual observance to its original date starting in 1978.

- **Other countries celebrate it, too, in their own ways.**

World War I was a multinational effort, so it makes sense that our allies also wanted to celebrate their veterans on Nov. 11. The name of the day and the types of commemorations differ, however.

Canada and Australia both call Nov. 11 “Remembrance Day.” Canada’s observance is pretty similar to our own, except many of its citizens wear red poppy flowers to honor their war dead. In Australia, the day is more akin to our Memorial Day.

Great Britain calls it “Remembrance Day,” too, but observes it on the Sunday closest to Nov. 11 with parades, services and two minutes of silence in London to honor those who lost their lives in war.
